MVAS Programs





Some folks call them "mudpeckers"—those non-descript little brown guys running around at the water's edge, and on beaches, mudflats, and sandbars. Shorebirds are a notoriously difficult group of birds to identify, and in response to requests coming out of our Intermediate Birdwatching courses, we're going to try a group-specific bird ID workshop. The workshop will be composed of 2 phases, starting with a classroom session to review field marks, along with seasonal and behavioral cues. A field workshop will follow, when we'll try to examine a good diversity of shorebirds to apply those cues in the field. The date and location for the field workshop is TBA, since it will depend on summer rainfall, river flows, and where the best assortment of shorebirds seems to be in mid- to late August.

Classroom Workshop: Mesilla Valley Bosque State Park, Saturday, August 23 at 10 AM. Bring field guides and a laptop or tablet if you've got one so we can do some detailed photo studies.

Field Workshop: Details TBA, but date will most likely be August 24 (unless weather or a complete lack of shorebirds calls for a later date), with potential locations to include Holloman Lakes, the Nutt-Hatch Playa, west El Paso wetland sites, and/or sites along the Rio Grande. Along with standard field gear, bring whatever identification resources you have, plus spotting scopes and digital cameras. Depending on what we see and what images folks acquire and are willing to share, we may compile some follow-up resources for participants from the day's outing.
