
MVAS Programs

Field Trips

Aguirre Springs & Holloman Lakes. March 24. We'll cross the mountains to hit 2 birding hotspots on the east side of the Organ Mountains for this trip. At the Aguirre Springs picnic area, we might pick up some foothill and montane species such as nuthatches and titmice, while the entrance road can yield numerous desert species and overwintering sparrows. Holloman Lakes, near Alamogordo, should give us a chance at a wide variety of wintering waterfowl and shorebirds, along with interesting species such as Harris's Hawks, Sage Sparrows, and longspurs. Lower Gila Box. April 28. Jennifer Montoya will lead our trip into this scenic canyon full of valuable riparian habitats north of Lordsburg. The Gila River is the only undammed major river in New Mexico, and the Lower Gila Box supports significant numbers of rare species including Zone-tailed, Gray, and Common Black-Hawks, Yellow-billed Cuckoos, and SW Willow Flycatchers. Participants will gather in Lordsburg at 7:30 AM (so you might consider an overnight stay in Lordsburg Friday night). Space is limited; registration required. Intermediate Birdwatching

Interested in improving your identification skills or learning more about the physical and behavioral adaptations that help birds survive? Through classroom sessions and field trips, we'll help you to improve your birding skills and to develop a deeper appreciation for these amazing creatures.

This course will focus on vocalizations, form & function, and bird behavior. On our field trips, we'll explore some of the diverse habitats that are found in our region, from wetlands to desert foothills.

Classroom Sessions will be held Tuesday evenings, April 10, 17, and 24. Half- to ¾-day field trips will be Saturdays, April 14, 21, and 28.

Cost is \$40 and space is limited. Registration deadline is March 27.

La Luz, Caballo CBC Highlights

On December 28, four parties conducted the La Luz Christmas Bird Count. The results were a respectable 85 species, with Ovenbird, Blue Jay, and Common Grackle representing new species for this count. Other good numbers were 7 Harris's Hawks and 5 Golden Eagles. As with other counts, this year, many land birds were in short supply. Many of the high elevation birds, such as Steller's Jay, were missing, and we tallied low numbers of nuthatches.

The Caballo CBC, held January 2, again had good species numbers—128 total—with Rusty Blackbird, Yellow-shafted Flicker, good numbers of Sandhill Cranes, and both California and Herring Gulls among the highlights. As with the other counts, the dry conditions made some of the normal land birds in short supply. In areas away from the Rio Grande we were hard pressed to find the normal numbers of sparrows. An example of low numbers also included species such as Spotted Sandpiper (1 only), along with low numbers of Northern Mockingbirds and Verdins. With good conditions, I feel this count could hit 150 species soon.
