"Birds of the Bosque" Presented in Las Cruces School

Early in February, Jessica Lagalo and Ken Barragan, two educators from the Randall Davey Audubon Center in Santa Fe, traveled south to our city to present a science outreach program called "Birds of the Bosque" at Valley View Elementary School. Funded through a grant from the PNM Foundation, the program introduces 4th and 5th grade students "to the importance of river habitat through the fascinating world of birds." Jessica and Ken have conducted it throughout the state since December 1.

The program consists of a full day of classroom instruction followed by a half-day field trip to a local birding location. Lorraine Schulte and Wendy Davis had the pleasure of observing one of the two classroom sessions at Valley View. Jessica and Ken did an outstanding job of teaching these active students about birds using a variety of props, artifacts and equipment. Their great sense of humor and infectious enthusiasm made the subject matter come alive.

They covered such topics as "what makes a bird a bird," feathers, bird anatomy and nests. The students examined feathers with jewelers' loupes, viewed slides of local birds, and played a game using bird field guides. The highlight of the day was dissecting owl pellets. Each child was given his/her own pellet and took it apart using dissecting tools to see what the owl had eaten. The entire class became very involved in the activity, and the students were excited and amazed by what they uncovered in the pellets. A chilly but fun-filled trip to Dripping Springs the following day completed the program.

Natural history programs like this are extremely valuable to our school systems. They can really turn a child on to science or start a student on the road to becoming a biologist or ecologist. We are grateful to Jessica and Ken for bringing "Birds of the Bosque" to Las Cruces, and we hope that more schools here will take advantage of this or other similar programs in the future.

Birdathon 2003

Mark your calendars! Spring is nearly here and the time is coming for **Birdathon 2003**, our yearly fundraiser.

This event, which will be held the weekend of May 3rd and 4th, raises the money to support our local educational projects such as Audubon Adventures. We have also been able purchase bird books for the library and would like to do more for the schools. Some of these funds may also be needed to support the Chapter newsletter which provides you with information about what the Chapter is doing in the areas of conservation, field trips, and programs. With the reduced share that we receive from the dues paid to National Audubon, **Birdathon** is more important than ever before. We need help from everyone in the Chapter either as a birder or sponsor. Let's make this a record year!

Birdathon is not only a great contribution to your local Chapter, it's also lots of fun.

How does **Birdathon** work? Each participating birder collects pledges from sponsors. The sponsor can pledge an amount of money per bird species or pledge a flat amount. (All contributions are tax deductible.) Then on **Birdathon** weekend the birder has 24 hours to count as many species as possible, either birding alone or with a team. Sponsors in the past have pledged \$.10 to \$1.00 a bird. And many teams see more than 100 species! Don't want to ask friends or co-workers for money? Pledge to yourself or ask relatives. A surprising number of people are happy to have been asked.

Although we have set the above weekend as the official **Birdathon** date for our chapter, you can do your count either before or after if it is more convenient. Also, **Birdathon** can be done in any location. If you expect to be traveling at that time, plan to set aside a few hours to bird. You probably will anyway. Right?

Legislative Updates

NM State Legislature. The state representatives and senators representing Doña Ana County have all expressed formal support for the Mesilla Valley Bosque Park (MVB) by introducing authorizing legislation and capital outlay requests for its establishment. If you haven't yet voiced your support for this proposal, at this stage probably the most critical call you could make would be to the Governor (1-505-476-2200), to urge him to support the full \$450,000 capital outlay request for land acquisition.



Programs

Programs and meetings are held each month, September - April, at the Village at Northrise, Hallmark Building, 2882 N. Roadrunner Pkwy, Las Cruces. Programs begin at 7:30 PM. News, announcements, and information begin at 7:00, preceding the program.

Percha Dam State Park. March 22. We will leave the Highway 70 K-Mart parking area at 6:30 AM and return mid-afternoon. We should expect to see woodpeckers, sparrows, blackbirds, snipes, hawks and a variety of waterfowl. Be sure to take water snacks or lunch. Chiricahua Mountains/Southeastern Arizona. April 26.

These spectacular "Sky Islands" of the Southwestern U.S. host many bird species which are rarely seen north of Mexico. The Trogans will be there at the time of this trip. Because of travel time (approximately 4 hours, one way from Las Cruces), most folks will do this as an overnight trip, camping in one of the Forest Service campgrounds along Cave Creek, or staying at lodging available in Portal, AZ. Red Crossbills. March 19. Dr. Craig Benkman, from the Department of Biology at NMSU, will update us on the fascinating natural history of these highly specialized seed-eating birds. His lab studies a diversity of topics including crossbill, conifer, and squirrel evolution, as well as the vocalizations of crossbills. Craig's enthusiasm for crossbills is contagious, so be ready to have a new favorite bird!

Bosque del Apache: Ongoing and Future Efforts. April 16.

Come learn a bit about the behind-the-scenes planning which helps make birding the Bosque del Apache National Wildlife Refuge a truly wondrous experience. Jim Savery, who recently became refuge manager, will catch us up on all the ongoing improvements at the Bosque. He'll also fill us in on what plans he has for further changes, and future needs the refuge might have.

Field Trip Report

Rio Bosque. January 18. Nine birders braved the heavy traffic on I-10 through El Paso to reach the Rio Bosque, a restored wetland near Socorro, TX. We were rewarded with some wonderful birds (54 species to be exact), including several great looks at a Sora: perfect light, perfect distance to fill up a scope's field of view, and a bird that was perfectly content to hang out at the edge of the reeds where nothing obscured our view. Other highlights included Lincoln's Sparrow, Green Heron, Black-necked Stilt, and huge flocks of dabbling ducks in all the flooded areas. Oh, and did I mention the three Harris's Hawks?

Audubon's **Issues and Action** page (at www.audubon.org/campaign/index.html) provides background information on a number of issues Audubon is following at the federal level. For instance, the site currently features an analysis of the federal budget passed in early February, describing environmental "winners" and "losers."

Audubon's **Take Action** website (www.capitolconnect.com/audubon) is updated daily, and provides additional information on key issues. This site is a little intimidating, because some of the areas require users to be registered, but even without being registered you can access useful information. Under the heading "Contact Legislators" you can access up-to-date information on select issues. Under the heading "Lawmaker Positions" you can track the voting record of individual senators and representatives on environmental legislation.


By registering at the Take Action site (in particular, by providing your residential address), you can utilize additional services. Registered users can access and edit sample letters on particular issues which will then be emailed or faxed (at no cost to the user) to the their legislators. Registered users can also edit sample letters to the editor which will then be sent directly to media outlets in their region. If you register, you can also choose to receive a twice monthly email update called *Audubon Advisory*.

Note: The Internet is an ideal resource for tracking legislation. If you are aware of other websites or listserves that you find useful for tracking federal or state legislation, please let me know. Future newsletter articles could highlight additional sources of timely information.
