A-Spear Ranch Selects MVAS for Study Of Its Unique Riparian Setting for Birds

Last October, Mesilla Valley Audubon Society led a field trip to beautiful Las Palomas Creek on the A-Spear Ranch, LLC, in Sierra County. This was the kick-off for a year of field visits by MVAS in order to build a bird list for this incredible example of a southwestern riparian gallery forest. Thanks to the efforts of C.J. Goin and other MVAS board members, we were able to post bird lists on eBird and the number of species observed and confirmed at the A-Spear currently stands at 106.

In 2017, nests and subsequent fledglings were observed, including for Common Black-Hawk, Swainson's Hawk, Cooper's Hawk, American Kestrel, Barn Owl and others. Mammal species thrive and proliferate on the ranch as well, with trail cameras capturing young elk, black bear, mule deer, bobcats and mountain lions.

In coming months, the ranch hopes to move forward with a conservation easement for the riparian area as well as further habitat improvements. This will include working with representatives from Bosque del Apache NWR to plant Monarch butterfly-friendly milkweed.

In addition, the owners of A-Spear hope to continue working with MVAS to develop projects that can be mutually beneficial to the ranch, MVAS, and, of course, the birds.

LAS CRUCES CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT ON DEC. 16

Our Las Cruces Christmas Bird Count (CBC) will be held on Saturday, Dec. 16, 2017, from sunrise to sunset. Mesilla Valley Audubon Society (MVAS) has sponsored this CBC for 43 years. Our CBC circle encompasses a varied habitat for birds – from a riparian corridor to agricultural fields to suburban areas to desert scrubland. This diversity often has yielded more than 130 species sighted during the CBC.

MVAS will hold a pre-CBC meeting on Wednesday, Dec. 13 at 7:00 PM at the Southwest Environmental Center (SWEC), 275 North Main Street on the Downtown Mall. The meeting provides an opportunity for team members to discuss final arrangements for the count day.

We have 13 teams of birders that cover the Las Cruces CBC circle. Please consider joining us in locating and counting birds on Dec. 16 and make a big contribution to citizen science. If you are new to the CBC, we will find a team that you can bird with. at 5:30 pm at the Southwest Environmental Center on the downtown mall. All Audubon members are welcome.

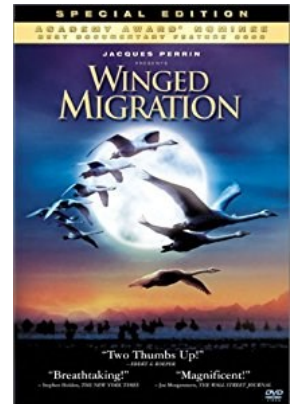

Three Enticing Programs Feature the Rio Grande, 'Winged Migration'

November 15 - Restoring the Rio Grande. Tyler Rogers of the San Andres National Wildlife Refuge, will discuss the work being done on the Rio Grande floodplain that benefits bird habitats. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, in partnership with private and state landowners, has enhanced habitat from Leasburg to Las Cruces.

December 13 - Christmas Bird Count Coordination Meeting (see article on Page 1) for details). NOTE: This is the second Wednesday of the month, rather than the third Wednesday.

January 17, 2018 - Movie night features the 2003 award-winning documentary, "Winged Migration." The movie was filmed over the course of four years on all seven continents using in-flight cameras, so that viewers appear to be flying alongside birds of successive species, especially Canada geese. They traverse every kind of weather, covering vast distances in a flight for survival. This spectacular film follows all manner of avifauna through their miraculous journeys. Hot toddies and popcorn will make this a perfect winter outing. All meetings begin at 7 p.m. with a social hour at 6:30 p.m. This also our annual meeting and officer elections (see below).
